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Did Someone Say Pumpkin Spice Latte? By Talyn Frick

SPICE

PUMPKIN

Add pumpkin puree and pie spice to a small saucepan over medium-high heat. Stir with a spatula until very fragrant and bubbly, 30 seconds - 1 minute, then add sugar and stir until smooth and frothy, another 30 seconds. Whisk in milk, add vanilla, and mix until the drink is hot for 2-3 minutes.

Brew espresso or coffee into a mug (or omit to keep this kid-friendly), then strain the milk mixture into the cup and serve. The straining step is optional but catches larger pumpkin pieces and chalky spices.

- 2 T 100% pumpkin puree slightly rounded
- 1/4 t pumpkin pie spice
- 1 T sugar (to taste)
- 1 C milk, any kind (try unsweetened almond milk)
- 1-1/2 t vanilla
- 1 shot espresso <u>OR</u>
 1/4 cup strongly brewed coffee
- Whipped cream OR coconut cream for topping, optional

Prepare Your Lawn for the Cold Seasons

The seasons are getting colder, and the days are getting shorter. It would be best if you started preparing for the holidays and the damage your lawn will face this winter. If you have never thought about taking care of your grass or are having trouble year after year with it, you must pay attention to this article!

Fall and winter can be very dry sometimes; roots and soil can suffer from these harsh conditions if not treated. Just like your dry skin, **moisturize it**! Rain, sprinkler, watering can, whatever you use to water your plants, make sure you **do not over-water in winter**.

Rake; it's hard work, but leaving dead leaves on your lawn can attract mold and bugs and leave no room for your grass to breathe. You can make it easier to transport the leaves by placing a lightweight tarp down to rake them onto.

Heavy soil can be hard to plant in and for grass to live in. You will get the best results if you **aerate your soil** in the **late spring or early summer**. It's a little late for that now, but it's good to remember for later.

Just like ensuring your soil is hydrated, it is just as essential to ensure it is **fertilized**. Please research what you should use and how you should apply it if this is your first time.

Lastly, should you **mow your lawn**? This isn't as necessary since your grass goes dormant in winter, but a **trim before winter** will help **prevent diseases**such as snow mold from building up in your grass.


Arista Hill


Ava Simmons

In the mouth of humanity


A man drowns alone
